JUTTING OUT ON THE NORTHERN PART OF LOMBOK IS A SMALL PENINSULA SURROUNDED BY TURQUOISE WATERS AND SQUEAKY WHITE SAND, THIS IS SIRA BEACH AND THE HOME OF VILLA SEPOI SEPOI.
